Results from the Gold Coast:

For the first time I played in the Gold Coast Congress (the 43rd) and it was a fabulous experience! If you have never gone, I recommend you do so. There are Open, Senior's and Restricted (not yet a Life Master) fields.

I started my week with the Gold Coast Youth Individual, and that was an eyeopener! Entry was available to Under 30s (whew – I just scraped in) but only two tables competed, which was very disappointing. The event was run by Larry Moses who plans on seeking sponsorship to make the event much bigger and more exciting next year. All Under 30s should keep an eye out for this event next year – if Larry has his way (and I think he just might) it will certainly be worth the trip!

The Carinya Walk-in pairs on the first night was excellent, starting with a free drink. 209 pairs competed, with scoring done within sections. Yours truly discovered what a 5:45am flight does to her bridge...

Next came the pairs, Open, Senior's and Restricted. There were 282 Open pairs, 174 Restricted pairs and 82 Senior's pairs. The winners were:



Hand of interest

Hand 6 NORTH, Dealer E, Vul: EW



Daniel/Christy suggested that EW should only bid to 3H, over which NS find a save of 3S. I think that reflects the modern style of pre-empting on bus-tickets, which means your partner never looks to convert preempts to game. To those using the old rule of 3 and 2, 3H by East looks like West should convert it to 4H. The 3S bid by South over 3H only makes it better. Since you don't pre-empt over a pre-empt, the 3H bid simply tells West that there are honest points in South, so one of the minor suit aces has to be there. This makes one of the \bigstar K or \bigstar Q an honest trick, which is enough to go to 4H.

This argument can be disputed. But the key point in the hand is the statement that 4H will not make, since declarer will go for the drop in trumps with a nine card fit. This argument I strongly suggest has a flaw. With nine trumps, trying to drop the queen instead of finessing is slightly preferred on probabilities. Unless, that is, the bidding or play indicates unbalanced distributions with the opponents. When South shows 6+ spades for the 3S bid, playing North for \checkmark Qxx is now definitely the superior line. (Nine never?? Never say never!)

Of course it didn't help most EWs. Most NSs found 4S as a save over 4H. This goes off against best defence, however 4S usually made. EW have to lead a diamond through the AQ early, then play K or Q of clubs on the first lead up to the AJT5 of clubs.

Other comments? No one played board 31, so you probably didn't notice in the commentary that these youth players seem to think that opening 1NT with a 5 card major is now standard practice with modern Standard. I think most people playing Standard for the last 20 years would find that very non-standard. We'll see over the next few years which approach becomes accepted.
