On behalf of BFACT, I would like to thank the participating clubs, whose support has continued the growth in each of the events this year. In particular I would like to thank the club organisers for their support, without which the events could not have been run.

The BFACT president, Beverly Carmichael, will be contacting you shortly about participation in the events in 2004.

This year's events raised a number of issues which will be considered for improving the events next year. In particular

- a) to assist most clubs in supporting a team in each event, I will recommend that when a club needs to participate in another town, only one of its teams will be required to travel on the designated day.
- b) rather than a complete round robin, I will recommend that matches be on a win/draw/loss basis, with clubs remaining in the event until its team has accumulated two losses or equivalent. This will mean that as the number of teams hopefully grows, the number of matches that a team can expect to play will generally be about 4 to 6. As well, this will naturally lead to the last match being between two surviving clubs, the winner to be the champion club for the year.
- c) while the early rounds will still be on designated Saturdays, I would like to schedule later rounds on a match by match basis. This will make it easier for small clubs to host matches either on their regular playing session or at the weekend, allowing a greater number of players to be made aware of the events. As well this will hopefully reduce the amount of travel required.

Problem 1

Contract: 6♦

You, West, hold:

▲ J763

♥ QT92

♦ K4

4 432

What is your opening lead?

Answer to Problem 1

The question is, of course, meaningless. You do not select an opening lead by merely glancing at your hand and noting the final contract. Rather, you must listen to the auction, weigh up all the clues the auction provides, and only then select a lead. Suppose that this is the auction:

North	South	
2*(1)	3♦	
4 .	4♦	
4NT	5 . (2)	
6♦	All Pass	

- (1) Artificial game force
- (2) Zero aces

South's 5. response to Blackwood showed no aces, so the trump ace must be with North or partner. In either case, the deceptive lead of the four of trumps – away from the doubleton king of trumps – is most unlikely to cost a trick. At the table, the lovely lead pressured declarer into a losing line:

South put up the ace of trumps, hoping that "East's" trump king was singleton. When that failed, declarer cashed clubs, hoping to discard all of South's heart losers. On the fourth round of clubs, East ruffed in with the ten of trumps. Declarer smiled, since now the contract was "guaranteed". Declarer over-ruffed with the jack of diamonds, intending to cross to dummy with the ace of spades, then discard South's last heart on a club. But West immediately over-over-ruffed with their "non-existent" trump king, then led a heart to partner's ace. One off in a "cold" contract.

Problem 2

The bidding has gone:

West North East South

Double Pass Pass Pass

You, West, hold: ♠ AKT6

v 2

◆ QJT8♣ KQ85

What is your opening lead?

Answer to Problem 2

Again, listening to the auction gives a clue as to the best lead. By passing your double of 1♥, partner is promising a very good holding in the heart suit. You should therefore avoid those tempting honour sequences, and instead lead your singleton trump to stop the opponents scoring cheap ruffing tricks. The complete deal might be:
